#### A Culture of Collaboration

#### Current Leadership Committed to Continuing Collaborative and Cost-Sharing Partnership

For over five decades, Central Ohio Technical College (COTC) and The Ohio State University at Newark have maintained a strong and enduring partnership. This collaboration is vital to both institutions, and President John Berry and Dean Matt Smith are enthusiastic about continuing it well into the future.

The two institutions share a 175-acre campus, including all buildings and general-purpose classrooms. They also jointly support approximately 80 staff members, operating expenses, and various capital equipment investments. While COTC and Ohio State Newark remain autonomous in their missions and curricula, they operate under an annual cost-sharing agreement. This agreement outlines shared expenses related to select personnel, facilities, operations, and capital equipment. Updating the agreement annually provides financial flexibility and helps protect both institutions in times of fluctuating enrollment.

This partnership gives COTC and Ohio State Newark a competitive advantage, not only through operational efficiencies but also by strengthening community support. The shared model is viewed positively by local residents and governing bodies, which further enhances the institutions' reputation and influence.

Established in 1983 by J. Gilbert Reese and Howard E. LeFevre, the Newark Campus Development Fund (NCDF) was created

to provide a unified philanthropic channel for community members to support both institutions on the Newark campus. NCDF complements the campus's unique cost-sharing arrangement by allowing donors to contribute to scholarships, grants, and capital improvements that benefit both schools – or to designate their gifts to support just one.

The cost-share partnership allows for more beautiful, state-of-the-art facilities and campus grounds.

#### A Model of Efficiency

- The cost-share partnership saves both institutions an estimated \$1.5 million per year in operating and financial efficiency as well as space utilization.
- The benefits of this agreement are further evidenced by the solid financial condition of both institutions which includes solid financial ratios, adequate operating reserves, and no facility debt.
- This unique collaboration allows both institutions to provide multiple pathways for student education; reduce unnecessary duplication; and promote the effective use of state fiscal, physical, and personnel resources.
- Ebbs and flows in student enrollment allow the campus to flex resources between both schools.
- Both schools can leverage state capital appropriations together and share the cost of campus maintenance and improvements, which allows for more beautiful, state-ofthe-art facilities and campus grounds.
- The cost-share partnership allows for deeper levels of service (e.g., student life, IT, public safety, library, access to residence halls, etc.).

COTC and Ohio State Newark are not in competition with one another. Together, they offer a variety of entrée points to meet the educational needs of students.

**Doug Marston** grew up understanding the importance of giving back. Throughout his life, he had exceptional role models in his parents, who were high school sweethearts. Doug's father, Larry, was one of seven children and the only one to graduate from college. His father's graduation from The Ohio State University was made possible by the GI Bill, which set their family

on a path toward success. After college, Larry worked at Owens Corning as a Cost-Control Accounting Supervisor. Doug's mother, Geraldine, entered the workforce right after high school and began her career at Park National Bank, where she worked for 44 years and became the first female Vice President.

After graduating from Newark High School, Doug attended Ohio Northern University. Each summer, he returned home and worked as a teller at Park National Bank. During his first summer there, John Alford gave him a memorable piece of advice: "I don't ever want you to be out of balance. But if you're ever out, I don't ever



want you to be over—I want you to be short. Because if you're over, I have a mad customer. But if you're short, I have a happy customer." This was Doug's first lesson in customer service.

He took that advice to heart and continued working at Park National Bank every summer until he graduated in 1979.

By 2000, Doug had returned to Park National Bank, where he began his long-standing involvement with the Red Cross. He now serves as the Community Volunteer Leader for Licking County. He recently spoke about the fundraising efforts for the new Red Cross location on Church Street, expressing pride in the generosity of the Licking County community. Doug said, "The other counties were amazed at the way Licking County responded to the fundraising ask." He continued, "They don't understand us. They don't understand the way we approach these things. They don't have that in other counties." Indeed, Licking County's spirit of giving is something truly special.

Throughout his successful career, Doug has learned many valuable lessons, not only from his parents but also from his time at Park National Bank. He shared, "I know how much of a burden it can be for someone to get a college degree, but it's

the absolute best leg up someone can have." Establishing the Douglas B. Marston Scholarship was important to Doug because he believes the Newark campus is one of the community's greatest assets. He wants more people to have the same opportunities he did. Doug understands how difficult it can be when a family can't afford college and has to rely on student loans.

"I've seen those credit reports," he said. "It's going to make it tougher for that student to get a car or a house—just to get those basic things you need. They're going to pay extra because of those loans."

Doug left us with a few pearls of wisdom: "You need to have goals. It's just as important now as when you were 15 years old." He added, "If you just move the needle a little bit, it helps. It doesn't take Superman swooping in to help someone out. If you help pay for just one quarter of education for someone, you've set that person up for success."



Faith Phillips, Director of Student Financial Services for Ohio State Newark and Central Ohio Technical College, has been a valued member of our campus community for 28 years. For nearly

three decades, she has witnessed remarkable growth, not only in student enrollment but also in the resources available to support student success. Thanks to the incredible generosity and ongoing commitment of our donors, Faith has seen scholarship opportunities more than triple during her tenure. This transformation is a testament to the power of donor stewardship and our shared dedication to empowering students and shaping brighter futures.

Jill strongly believes in being a positive role model for their son. She wants him to



For Andrew and Jill, seeing the names on the buildings across campus and knowing who those families are is deeply meaningful. That kind of leadership has played a vital role in their lives and has helped shape their philanthropic giving.
