A Message from our Chairman and Executive Director

December 1983 marked the beginning of the Newark Campus Development Fund with its first major fundraising drive, "Access to Excellence." The highly successful campaign raised \$2.5 million, the largest local fundraising drive at the time, thus creating a vehicle for our community to jointly support Central Ohio Technical College and Ohio State Newark with their philanthropic gifts.

The initial funds supported crucial needs at both institutions such as additional scholarships, faculty development and support, nursing school program expansion, and upgrades to science laboratories and computer technologies, ensuring a high-quality college education would be available to any local person.

It was stated that the funds raised would be used for two important and basic purposes: to maintain and enhance the level of education and technological excellence for which the Newark campus had come to be noted throughout the state; and to make that excellence more accessible not only to qualified high school graduating seniors, but also to people of all ages desiring advanced education.

Those simple but lofty goals have endured for these past 40 years. Their relevance to the work of the Newark Campus Development Fund can be seen in today's expansion of educational offerings on the Newark campus, growth in advanced degrees and coursework, new technologies, and the build-out of state-of-the-art facilities.

The founders of the Newark Campus Development Fund laid out the necessity of our work in that initial campaign by declaring, "Both Ohio State Newark and COTC have crucial, urgent needs that must be met, if their level of education and instructional excellence is to be secured for the years ahead and if that excellence is to be made more accessible to those wishing to avail themselves of it."

We have remained steadfast in our commitment to maintaining, enhancing, and ensuring access to that excellence on the Newark campus. Thank you for your continued partnership and support.



Renovation of Founders Hall

Founders Hall, the first and largest building, opened in 1968 and has served the campus's needs well over the past five decades. However, a current major renovation, led by local firm Robertson Construction, will renew the lifespan of the building, giving it a new, more modern identity and ultimately enhance student learning, heighten student success, and elevate the student experience.

When the renovation is completed in summer 2024, Founders Hall will honorifically be renamed Louella Hodges Reese Hall in acknowledgment of Lou Reese's enduring support of the Newark campus over the last six decades. The visionary leadership and generous support given by her and her husband, Gib, through scholarships, capital improvements, programming, and public art, have shaped the Newark campus and the student experience since its inception.


